

Over recent years, CCWA has introduced several safety advancements, including MITCH (Mobile, Illuminated Traffic Control Hub), the Speed Shore hydraulic shoring system, the AF-100 automated flagger, and Blackline Safety G7 gas detectors, all designed to enhance employee safety.

"Safety is our highest priority, and we are always striving to improve our safety program," says CCWA CEO H. Bernard Franks. "I am very proud of the innovations we have made over the past few years, and it is a tremendous honor to be recognized at the national level. Conserve Water AND Save Money by Finding & Fixing These Household Leaks

Household leaks contribute to the loss of more than 1 trillion gallons of water per year. Help save water and money on your bill by finding leaks in your home.



FAUCETS – A leaky faucet that drips at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons per year! Check faucets in the bathroom and kitchen periodically. Worn washers are most often the cause of dripping faucets.



TOILETS - Toilet leaks are the most common household leak! You can use food coloring or dye tablets to check your toilet. Have a leak? It might be your flapper. Replacing an old flapper is a quick, easy, and inexpensive fix. Just visit your local hardware store.



SHOWERHEADS - A showerhead leaking at 10 drips per minute wastes more than 500 gallons per year. Check your showerhead for leaks to avoid costly drips!



SPRINKLERS - Broken sprinkler heads or damaged underground pipes are common sources of sprinkler system leaks. Watch your system run at least once per month to spot problems early.
